The California Department of Justice, Office of the Attorney General is currently recruiting students for its 2012 Summer Internship Program. The Civil Law Division, Correctional Law Section ("CLS"), provides exciting and rewarding opportunities for candidates interested in pursuing a career in public service and civil litigation.

Deputy Attorneys General in CLS represent employees of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation in civil suits filed by prisoners and parolees. Cases range in scope from individual damages claims to large-scale class actions seeking permanent injunctive relief, and present issues ranging from state tort claims to complex constitutional issues. Deputies are responsible for their own cases from the initial appearance in trial court through appeal, and appear regularly in both state and federal court. The majority of the section's cases involve defending federal civil rights lawsuits challenging conditions of confinement.

Students in CLS's Summer Internship Program will prepare civil pleadings, including motions to dismiss and motions for summary judgment. Typical motions address procedural and substantive issues, including qualified immunity and the merits of constitutional claims. Students may also draft or make substantial contributions to appellate briefs submitted by the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. Each student is supervised by a deputy, who will review the student's written work.

Applicants for the CLS Summer Internship Program must have excellent writing, research, and analytical skills. Applicants should have completed law school classes in constitutional law, civil procedure, and research and writing. Appellate and trial advocacy may be helpful. We are only accepting applications for rising second and third year law students for the Summer Internship Program.
